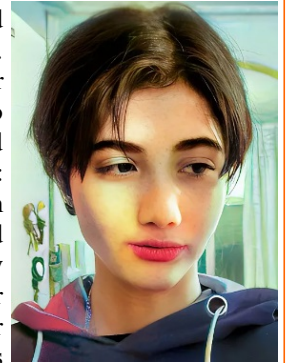

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Armita became a victim of compulsory Islamic veiling

Armita Geravand, a 16-year-old schoolgirl who was on her way to school with her friends on Sunday 1 October, was severely beaten in Tehran's metro by the Islamic Republic's hijab police, resulting in a brain haemorrhage. Armita has been in a coma ever since. She is being guarded by heavily-armed state security forces at Fajr Hospital in Tehran. The hospital has been surrounded by the security forces and any outside access to her has been restricted. Even the hospital's medical staff are not allowed on the floor where she has been admitted. Armita's mother is reported to have been detained by the police, and the media have been barred from reporting on her condition. Upon entering the metro station, Armita was without a head covering, which resulted in her being

targeted by the hijab police and their violent assault on her. Amnesty International has called for an independent investigation into Armita's critical injuries, "amid mounting evidence of a cover up": <https://tinyurl.com/yx4t3z74> In September last year, 22-year-old Mahsa (Jina) Amini was similarly assaulted by the security forces for "improper hijab", resulting in her death in custody after several days in coma. Mahsa's state murder became a spark for the nationwide Woman Life Freedom revolution.



Narges Mohammadi won the Nobel Peace Prize



The Nobel Peace Prize was awarded to Narges Mohammadi, who is a political prisoner in Iran. This is an important step in

support of the Woman Life Freedom revolution. This award recognises the brave Iranian women's fight for freedom and highlights the situation of political prisoners in Iran. The brave women of Iran are at the forefront of the fight against the Islamic regime, and Narges Mohammadi is one of those women. We congratulate her.

October 10th is the International Day against the heinous and Inhumane Death Penalty

This year the number of executions carried out by the Islamic regime of Iran has increased. According to the reports, at least 617 citizens, including 13 women and 6 children, were executed in 2022, which has increased by more than 80% compared to 2021. Also, in the first half of this year, at least 329 people have been executed by the Islamic regime. According to Herana, a human rights organisation in the last ten years (2013 to 2023), a total of 4,829 executions have been carried out in Iran.

People in Iran have entered into a decisive confrontation with the Islamic regime and they want to get rid of this regime. The Islamic regime has no place in the future of Iran. The future belongs to the people. The cooperation of you, the people of the world, with the people of Iran in this struggle, will help to establish a free, equal and humane society.



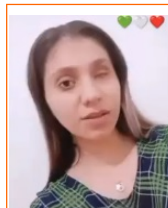
Hijab police officers in Tehran's subways

The task of hijab police in Tehran's subway trains system is to prevent the entry of girls without hijab into the

subway. They first warn the girls, and when they face resistance, they resort to violence; they either arrest the girls or prevent them from boarding the trains.

Last year, Mahsa Jina Amini was arrested in one of Tehran's subways and was brutally assaulted, resulting in her death. Hundreds of such confrontations occur daily in Tehran's subways.

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They blinded Kowsar and sentenced her to 5 months in prison

Kowsar Eftekhari is a theatre actor. She lost one eye a year ago when she was shot by the Iranian regime's security forces. Kowsar said on her Instagram account that the Islamic regime's judiciary have now sentenced her to five months in prison on charges of "propaganda against the regime" and illegal assembly.

Kowsar is just one example. A large number of wounded protesters and even the families of those killed in last year's protests have been sentenced to long prison terms
