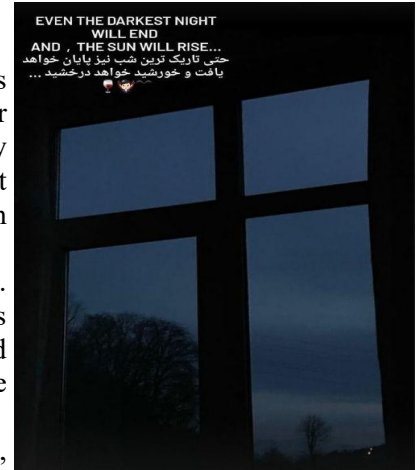

**"Even the darkest night will end,
and the sun will rise.."**

Armita wrote this sentence in one of her Instagram stories with a photo of a window that shows morning twilight weather. A window is probably the window of her room which she looked out from there daily.



Armita Grouvand was 17 years and 6 months old when "without wearing mandatory hijab" with two of her friends was going to school in Tehran's Shahada Square subway like every day and she was beaten by security forces "hejabbans" because she was not wearing a hijab. They "pushed" her and as a result "Armita's head hit an iron bar and she fainted."



She was in a coma for 28 days. During this time, Armita's family was under pressure and harassment from the government agents.

Armita's mother was arrested, so they could not report about Armita.

A few days ago, the news agency "Berna" reported in a short news about the "certainty of brain death" of Armita. Although this news did not have any details and its source of information was not specified, other state media quickly republished it. The government kept Armita's death a secret for fear of public protests and finally on Saturday 28 October they published her death.



Our beloved Armita was buried on Sunday 29 October in a cemetery near Tehran and millions of people around the world mourned her loss. Armita, a teenage girl was killed by Islamic regime of Iran just for not wearing an Islamic mandatory hijab.

This kind of murdering like killing Mahsa and Armita happened as a result of the Islamic regime's anti-women policies.

Armita was a girl full of passion for life; she loved cats, painting, BTS, anime, fashion, taekwondo, etc. She was a girl like her other generations, and does not fit into the existing framework of the Islamic regime.

Although Armita is only 17 years old, she managed "Don 3", this Korean martial art. Paintings are hanging on four sides of the walls of Armita's room. Her desk is full of painting tools, paints, pens, paper and canvas.

The story of Armita reminds everyone of Mahsa (Gina) Amini, who was killed because of the type and optional cover in the custody of the security forces. The memory of dear Armita is always with us.
